Current Situation:

Since the death of George Floyd on May 25th there have been numerous demonstrations and protests across the country often ending in violence, destruction, and injuries. On May 30th a protest march in Seattle turned violent, destroyed police vehicles and buildings, and injured police and members of the public. Seattle issued a curfew and requested support from the National Guard.

It is reported that Kirkland has a protest at occurring at 14:00 and a candlelight vigil at 19:30 with the potential for malicious actors to use the protest as a cover to become violent.

Current and Planned Objectives:



- 1) Support life safety of first responders, demonstrators, City staff, and other members of the public.
- 2) Monitor the status and progression of the demonstration and provide incident stabilization if needed.
- 3) Defer destruction of public and private property in Kirkland.
- 4) Facilitate flow of vehicular and pedestrian traffic in the area of the demonstration and evacuate the area if needed.



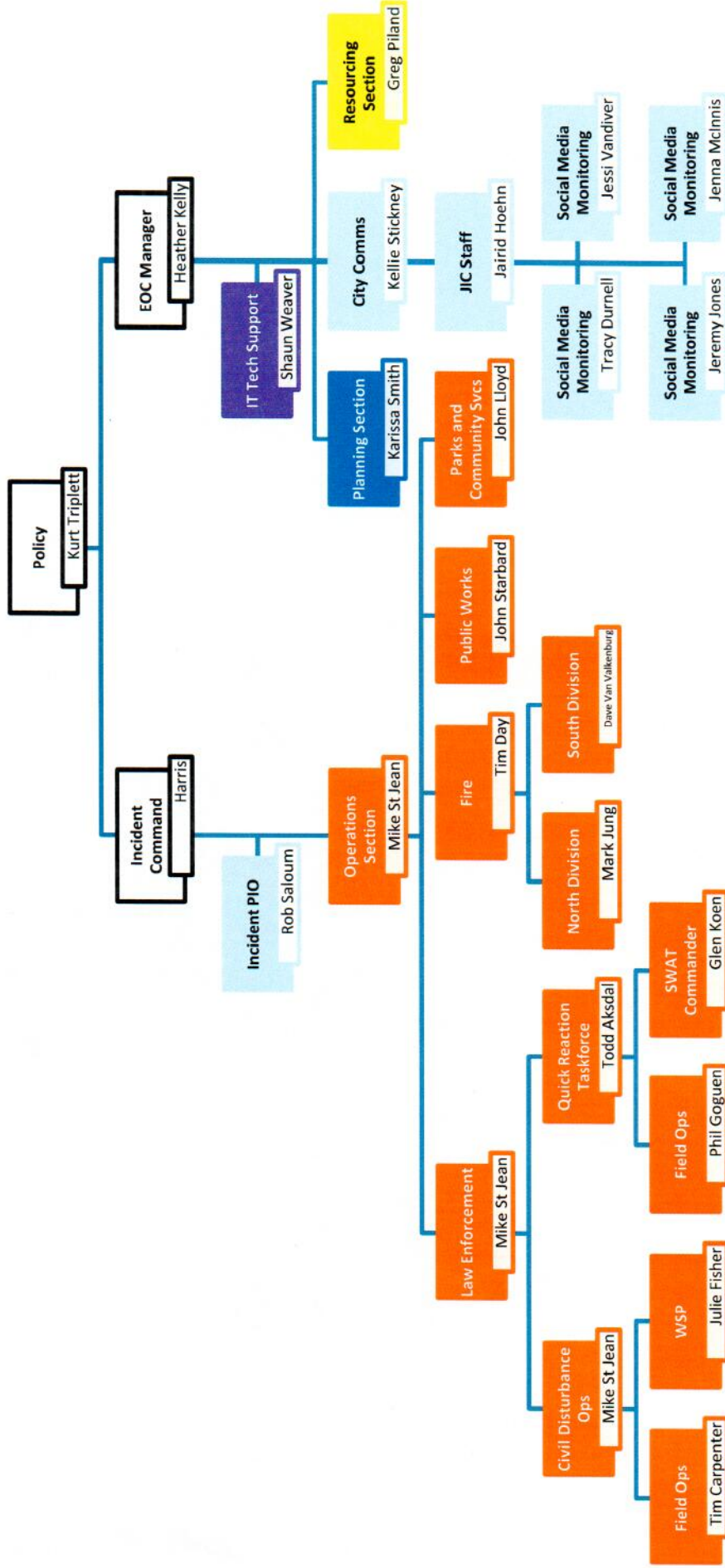
INCIDENT ORGANIZATION CHART (ICS 207)

Subject: Operation Plan – June 1, 2020 protest in support of George Floyd

Mission

To protect life and property, preserve the peace, suppress illegal activities, and expedite the orderly flow of pedestrian and vehicular traffic. We will also ensure the safety of all citizens in the City of Kirkland and provide citizens the opportunity to lawfully participate in exercising their right to freedom of speech and assembly.

Situation

This operation plan is in preparation for a possible protest that is scheduled to occur on Monday, June 1. This protest is being advertised on several social media sites. In addition, a candlelight vigil is being planned for 1930 in Marina Park. As you all know, the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis has caused great unrest throughout the country, to include Seattle. There were several peaceful protests over the last two days in Seattle and Bellevue, but outside groups have taken advantage of the situation and have caused great damage and injuries by rioting.

Planning Assumptions

Our current intelligence speaks to people trying to organize a protest for 1400 hours in downtown Kirkland. In addition, a candlelight vigil is being organized for 1930 hours in Marina Park. We do not know how many people will be attending this event. Several other calls for protests have been reported for Lynnwood, south King County areas, and the Tulalip outlet mall. In addition, it is entirely possible for protests to continue today in Bellevue and Seattle.

Crowd behavior is subject to many variables, many of which are beyond the control of law enforcement. While it is our hope that this event will not include acts of civil unrest or violence, immediate past history in Bellevue and Seattle show that looting, vandalism and armed

individuals will likely show up and act in a criminal manner, hiding behind the curtain of the peaceful protesters.

Concept of Operations

Operational goals for this operation will be:

- Life Safety
- Incident Stabilization
- Property Conservation
- Effective flow of vehicular and pedestrian traffic

Mutual Aid: Redmond bike unit will be here to assist 8 and supervisor, Normandy Park (2) Clyde Hill (7), WSP civil disturbance (24 and 2 Lts) and NSM here. Additional requests have gone out to regional assets to include National Guard.

Event Timeline:

1400 Protest scheduled to start in downtown Kirkland
1930 possible candlelight vigil scheduled for Marina Park

Police Timeline:

1300-1330: Briefing
1330-1345: Officers get needed gear and stage at City Hall
1400-? Officers downtown to monitor protest and ensure peaceful march

- The on-duty patrol squad will respond to emergency calls only and will report to their duty supervisor.
 - Unless otherwise specified, Patrol will not have a primary responsibility to the event unless otherwise directed by command.
- Officers will attend a pre-event briefing at 1300 at Kirkland City Hall totem lake room or outside.
 - Officers working this event will:

- be prepared for all weather conditions.
 - be self-sufficient for the duration of this event
 - **will have access to ppe, to include face masks, eye pro and gloves**
 - have access to their gas masks
 - have their traffic control vests
 - be prepared and equipped to take reports, render assistance, make arrests, and issue citations as needed.
 - conduct themselves in a professional manner and will not vacate their assigned post unless authorized to do so by command.
 - not congregate unnecessarily with other officers working the detail and will remain highly visible.
 - become familiar with their duty stations, assignment details, and staging areas.
- The EOC has been activated and Chief Harris, DC Aksdal and DC St. Jean will be located there.
 - Lieutenant Carpenter and Goguen will be mobile and acting as the Field Commanders of their elements. All communication should be routed to them.
 - Redmond Bike Officers and WSP civil disturbance team will be deployed downtown
 - The majority of the Kirkland officers will be deployed in two man cars deployed by quadrants as a QRF. Some Kirkland Officers will be assigned with Redmond Bikes and WSP to assist in local geography and communication.
 - Officers will keep Lieutenant Carpenter apprised of the crowd size and demeanor.
 - Any injuries sustained by officers and/or participants should be communicated to Incident Command where it will be passed on to Fire for an expedited response.

Crowd Control

This event is designed to be a peaceful protest and rally. However due to the potential crowd size and other recent local events, the following shall be the levels of response for crowd control.

Level 1 Response Crowd Control

Level 1 is identified as a pro-active and visible presence during the initial gathering at PK Park. Bicycle and foot officers will be deployed and will be a highly visible and interactive presence.

This staffing will provide crowd control / law enforcement services to cooperative, small to mid-size, crowds and can provide escort and mitigate the impact on the traffic flow in the area.

All officers assigned to this event will be responsible for advising the Field Commander (Lieutenant Carpenter) of any changing crowd and/or traffic situations. This will include the deployment of the officers staged at City Hall and the Bike Patrol Officers will be specifically targeting the incident.

Level 2 Response Crowd Control

Level 2 resources will address crowd control issues that are beyond the capability of the officers assigned to this event. This might involve a larger crowd that is not cooperative with law enforcement. Level 2 resources are capable of deploying to move a crowd, protecting avenues of approach and departure, and conducting single incident arrests.

Based on an assessment of the crowd activity, its size and perceived intentions, the Incident Commander will order the deployment of some, or all, of the on-duty patrol units. Aid will also be moved into a forward stage position near the City Shops.

If it appears that a majority of deployed units will become engaged in a protracted event that has a potential to grow larger, Field Commander Lieutenant Carpenter will consult with the Incident Commander, DC St. Jean, regarding moving to a Level 3 response. At a minimum, the Incident Commander will warn all appropriate mutual aid and neighboring law enforcement jurisdictions of a possible activation, and if appropriate, an estimated time of arrival will be obtained. Communication and detention centers will also be given a situation report.

Level 3 Response Crowd Control

The Incident Commander will make the decision on the activation of the Level 3 response. This can involve the activation of additional mutual aid resources such as King County Sheriffs Office, Redmond, Medina, Bothell, Bellevue, Seattle, or Washington State Patrol Police Agencies. This would include a request for these agencies civil disturbance teams.

Level 3 resources will be strongly considered when some or all of the criteria below are present:

- Majority of Level 2 resources become engaged in protracted, large, crowd control issues beyond their capability to effectively control
- Large crowd control problems that develop in other areas of the city and are beyond the capability of on-duty officers to address
- Prisoner processing becomes overwhelmed with arrests and/or the jail is unable to accept more prisoners for an extended period.

Even with advance warning, Level 3 mutual aid resources will have a delayed response.

Direction and Control

The Commander for the civil disturbance event is DC St. Jean. Lieutenant Carpenter will be the mobile Field Commander. All officers assigned to this event will be under the authority of the Incident and Field Commander.

The Commander for the criminal and QRF part of this event is DC Aksdal. Lieutenant Goguen will be the mobile Field Commander. All officers assigned to this event will be under the authority of the Incident and Field Commander.

The Incident Commander shall have the authority over the decision to conduct mass arrests.

Except for exigent circumstances requiring the immediate discharge of less lethal riot control equipment for a life safety issue, the authority for release of less lethal riot control equipment shall proceed from the Field Commander to the Incident Commander.

On 30 May 2020 at about 1753 hours I received a page for North Sound Metro (NSM) to stage at the Kirkland Police station to respond to assist with Seattle PD who were in the middle of a riot.

I arrived at the Kirkland Police station and gathered my assigned equipment the rest of the NSM team. I then drove to the staging area in Seattle. Once there I was assigned the less-lethal impact munition, which I loaded with KO1 rounds. I then deployed into downtown Seattle as a passenger in the Bearcat.

Once we arrived in downtown Seattle our assigned task was to respond to priority calls for service, calls of looters, as well as support Seattle bike squads dealing with the individuals who were rioting. I responded to various stores, to include Men's Warehouse, Target, a smoke shop, Bank of America...etc in the downtown area with the rest of the NSM team to the report of looters.

Eventually we responded to an intersection near Nordstrom where a large group of rioters were gathering and throwing various items at Seattle PD units. When I arrived and exited my vehicle, I noted rocks and various items being thrown at both NSM team members as well as Seattle PD bike units. I estimated there to be hundreds of individuals in each direction of the intersection. In each direction I could see dozens of individuals entering and leaving various stores with stolen merchandise, this was despite the fact workers were attempting to board up the stores since almost every window had been shattered. LT Brooks with the Seattle bike team asked us to deploy OC and CS gas to disperse the rioters. I deployed two (2) hand delivered CS canisters directly towards the front of the crowd who were failing to disperse and throwing items at myself and other Officers. Once the canisters started to expel the CS gas the crowd dispersed, and no additional canisters were necessary. Once the crowd was dispersed, I returned to my assigned vehicle and moved to the next call for service.

I later responded to Bank of America to the report that several individuals had broken into the bank and were burglarizing it. As I arrived, I saw a Seattle PD Officer in a foot pursuit with one of the suspects. I assisted in taking one of the suspects into custody who was attempting to flee the area on foot. As I approached the bank several other SPD Officers were detaining two more individuals who were found in the entry way to the bank. I then helped clear the inside of the bank and did not locate any additional individuals inside.

After we cleared the bank the team responded to the report of a shooting suspect being located only a few blocks away. NSM arrived in the area where they were last seen. When I exited the vehicle, I assisted Seattle PD by helping detain two of the involved individuals. Both individuals were handcuffed

by SPD Officers. While I was assisting with detaining the second individual, I could hear someone yell that they had located a pistol next to a backpack that was located on the ground only feet from where the involved individuals had been detained.

The remainder of the time I was in Seattle I, along with the rest of the NSM team conducted roving patrols to locate looters that were burglarizing various stores in the downtown area.

Once NSM was released from assisting Seattle PD I returned to the Kirkland Police station and secured my assigned equipment.

Supplemental Report
Detective P. Mades #389

On 5/30/20 at approximately 1753 hours I received page for a North Sound Metro call out reference a Seattle PD riot. I was advised to meet at Kirkland PD, 11750 NE 118th St. Kirkland, WA 98034, for the staging area.

Upon arriving I at Kirkland PD we loaded the armored vehicles with the proper equipment needed. Our team was divided into three separate vehicles. I was assigned to the Bearcat. We contacted Lt. Brooks of the bike unit. We were informed they needed more chemical munitions. We were authorized to deploy chemical munitions (OC/CS) to support his officers' safety and disperse the rioters. We were asked to assist with roving patrol for looters and were informed we would be dispatched to locations for assistance.

We were first advised there were looters at the Men's Wearhouse located at 1404 4th Ave Seattle, WA 98101. Upon arriving the looters scattered and we held our position for security. Several looters were moving barricades NE of our location we moved up and helped secure the barricades. We were dispatched to several other stores, (Target, Pawn Shop, Sephora, Nordstrom (Protected workers so they could board up the store), Smoke Shop) for security and to remove looters. Several times after we left, we were dispatched to the same location. Subjects were running all over the streets with stolen merchandise.

I observed graffiti on almost every block with sayings such as BLM (Black Lives Matter), Fuck the pigs, kill the police/12. Every store we were called to had broken windows and the inside was ransacked. There were so many people around it was hard to estimate the numbers. On one block I observed a whole row of cars which had been burned up. Every scene was so chaotic we were not actively trying to arrest for property crimes. We were just hoping they would leave the area.

At one point we were called to assist with subjects breaking into a Bank of America located at 500 Olive Way Seattle, WA 98101. As we turned the corner a suspect was running toward us and was detained. Two other subjects were located inside and arrested.

At another point during the night we were dispatched to a subject shooting a gun. As we arrived Seattle PD officers had several subjects pruned out on the ground. As the subjects were being detained. We cleared the immediate area for any other subjects. I observed a backpack with a black gun laying on the ground near a small (two and a half feet in height) cement pillar. I informed a Seattle PD Officer where the gun was located and observed the Officer take pictures of the gun and collect it as evidence.
