What is your approach to improving public safety over the next five years? How will you actualize it?

Public safety goes beyond law enforcement; it is a shared priority across all city departments. An example of that is Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED). This practice involves designing natural environments and amenities, such as shrubs and lighting, in a way to reduce crime and improve the quality of life. This is something the city has started to implement throughout all projects. I am committed to partnering with our diverse community to enhance the quality of life and reduce crime. I am commitment to building strong, trusting relationships with our community. Through open dialogue and collaboration to address key issues of equity, transparency, and accountability, I believe we can improve Public Safety. We need to improve our civil engagement programs to give the opportunity to our residents to provide valuable insight and recommendations on ways to strengthen community-police relations and enhance public service.
